Dr. Amineh Hoti is an accomplished Social Anthropologist and an innovative peace studies designer and leader. She has been invited twice to the White House in Washington DC to participate and speak on peacebuilding. She is the governor of St. Mary's Senior School Cambridge for Equality, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI). Amineh Hoti obtained her Ph.D. from the University of Cambridge where she was awarded the Wyse Fund, Trinity College. She graduated from the London School of Economics where she received the Foreign and Commonwealth Award for developing global leaders. She is a Fellow Commoner, Lucy Cavendish College, University of Cambridge, and has supervised undergraduates from half a dozen Cambridge colleges.
